

Safety Summary

The following safety precautions apply to both operating and maintenance personnel and must be followed during all phases of operation, service, and repair of this instrument.

Before applying power to this instrument:

- Read and understand the safety and operational information in this manual.

- Verify that the voltage selector at the line power cord input is set to the correct line voltage. Operating the instrument at an incorrect line voltage will void the warranty.
- Make all connections to the instrument before applying power.
- Do not operate the instrument in ways not specified by this manual or by B&K Precision.

Category rating

The IEC 61010 standard defines safety category ratings that specify the amount of electrical energy available and the voltage impulses that may occur on electrical conductors associated with these category ratings. The category rating is a Roman numeral of I, II, III, or IV. This rating is also accompanied by a maximum voltage of the circuit to be tested, which defines the voltage impulses expected and required insulation clearances. These categories are:

Category I (CAT I): Measurement instruments whose measurement inputs are not intended to be

connected to the mains supply. The voltages in the environment are typically

derived from a limited-energy transformer or a battery.

Category II (CAT II): Measurement instruments whose measurement inputs are meant to be connected

to the mains supply at a standard wall outlet or similar sources. Example measurement environments are portable tools and household appliances.

Category III (CAT III): Measurement instruments whose measurement inputs are meant to be

connected to the mains installation of a building. Examples are measurements

inside a building's circuit breaker panel or the wiring of permanently-installed motors.

Category IV (CAT IV): Measurement instruments whose measurement inputs are meant to be

connected to the primary power entering a building or other outdoor wiring.



Electrical Power

This instrument is intended to be powered from a CATEGORY II mains power environment. The mains power should be 115 V RMS or 230 V RMS. Use only the power cord supplied with the instrument and ensure it is appropriate for your country of use.



Do not use this instrument in an electrical environment with a higher category rating than what is specified in this manual for this instrument.



You must ensure that each accessory you use with this instrument has a category rating equal to or higher than the instrument's category rating to maintain the instrument's category rating. Failure to do so will lower the category rating of the measuring system.

Ground the Instrument



To minimize shock hazard, the instrument chassis and cabinet must be connected to an electrical safety ground. This instrument is grounded through the ground conductor of the supplied, threeconductor AC line power cable. The power cable must be plugged into an approved three-conductor electrical outlet. The power jack and mating plug of the power cable meet IEC safety standards.



Do not alter or defeat the ground connection. Without the safety ground connection, all accessible conductive parts (including control knobs) may provide an electric shock. Failure to use a properly-grounded approved outlet and the recommended three-conductor AC line power cable may result in injury or death.



Unless otherwise stated, a ground connection on the instrument's front or rear panel is for a reference of potential only and is not to be used as a safety ground. Do not operate in an explosive or flammable atmosphere.



Environmental Conditions

This instrument is intended to be used in an indoor pollution degree 2 environment. The operating temperature range is 0°C to 40°C and 20% to 80% relative humidity, with no condensation allowed.

Measurements made by this instrument may be outside specifications if the instrument is used in non-office-type environments. Such environments may include rapid temperature or humidity changes, sunlight, vibration and/or mechanical shocks, acoustic noise, electrical noise, strong electric fields, or strong magnetic fields.



Do not operate the instrument in the presence of flammable gases or vapors, fumes, or finely-divided particulates.

The instrument is designed to be used in office-type indoor environments. Do not operate the instrument

- In the presence of noxious, corrosive, or flammable fumes, gases, vapors, chemicals, or finely-divided particulates.
- In relative humidity conditions outside the instrument's specifications.



- In environments where there is a danger of any liquid being spilled on the instrument or where any liquid can condense on the instrument.
- In air temperatures exceeding the specified operating temperatures.
- In atmospheric pressures outside the specified altitude limits or where the surrounding gas is not air.

Do not operate instrument if damaged

Clean the instrument only as instructed

Do not touch live circuits

Instrument covers must not be removed by operating personnel. 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Introduction

1.1 Product Overview

The BK Precision 4078C and 4079C are versatile dual channel arbitrary waveform generator. This generator is capable of generating arbitrary waveforms with 16-bit resolution and length up to 4,000,000 points. Users can create arbitrary waveforms directly from the front panel using the generator's built-in waveform editing functions or load arbitrary waveforms via the instrument's remote interfaces.

In addition to the large waveform memory, the generator offers AM, FM, PM, PWM, BPSK and FSK modulation along with sweep, burst, and flexible triggering capabilities.

The instrument can be remotely operated via the USBTMC, LAN, or GPIB (IEEE-488.2) interface supporting SCPI commands.



1.2 Features

The 407XC seires dimensions are approximately: 213 mm x 88 mm x 300 mm (8.4" x 3.5" x 12") (W x H x D).




Figure 1.2 Dimensions

1.5 Rackmount Installation

The instrument can be installed in a standard 19-inch using the optional rackmount kit.



Remove the carrying handle before mounting the instrument. To remove the handle, grasp the handle by its sides, pull outwards, and rotate it until the arrow on the handle and the arrow on the plastic ears are in opposite directions. Then pull the handle outward.

Getting Started

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2.1 Preliminary Information

Before getting started, please inspect the instrument mechanically and electrically upon receiving it. Unpack all items from the shipping carton, and check for any obvious signs of physical damage that may have occurred during transportation. Report any damage to the shipping agent immediately.

Save the original packing carton for possible future reshipment. Every power supply is shipped with the following contents:

Review Safety Information

This power system is a Safety Class 1 instrument, which means it has a protective earth terminal. That terminal must be connected to earth ground through a power source equipped with a ground receptacle.

Refer to the **Safety Summary** page at the beginning of this guide for general safety information. Before installation or operation, check the power system and review this guide for safety warnings and instructions. Safety warnings for specific procedures are located at appropriate places throughout this manual.

Observe Environmental Conditions

The environmental conditions of the power system are documented under Environmental Characteristics. The unit should only be operated indoors in a controlled environment.

The dimensions of your instrument as well as an outline diagram are also documented under Specifications. A fan cools the power system by drawing air through the sides and exhausting it out the side and back. The instrument must be installed in a location that allows sufficient space at the sides and back of the unit for adequate air circulation



Do not operate the instrument in the presence of flammable gases or fumes.



Verify AC Input Voltage

Verify and check to make sure proper AC voltages are available to power the instrument. The AC voltage range must meet the acceptable specification as explained in **section 2.2**.

Self Adjust

At power-on, the waveform generator performs a diagnostic self-test procedure to check itself for errors. If it finds an error, an error code and text will appear in the display window. Other error codes appear when you enter an invalid front-panel setting. For more information on error codes, see the Self Test Error Table. When the waveform generator finishes the diagnostic self-test routine, it enters the local state (LOCS) and assumes power-on default settings.

2.2 Input Power and Fuse Requirements

The AC input on the back of your unit is a universal AC input. It accepts nominal line voltages in the range of 100 VAC to 240 VAC. The frequency can be 50/60 Hz. The maximum rated input power is 50 VA.



FIRE HAZARD Use only the power cord that was supplied with your instrument. Using other types of power cords may cause overheating of the power cord, resulting in fire.

SHOCK HAZARD The power cord provides a chassis ground through a third conductor. Be certain that your power outlet is of the threeconductor type with the correct pin connected to earth ground.

Before connecting the power cord to the IEC 320 connector on the rear panel of the uint, be sure that the power switch is in the OFF position and verify that the AC power cord, including the extension line, is compatible with the rated voltage/current and that there is sufficient circuit capacity for the waveform generator. Once verified, connect the cable firmly.



2.3 Fuse Replacement

The fuse is accessible through the rear panel beneath the IEC 320 connector. A 1 A at 250V, UL/CSA approved slow blow fused is required.

Table 2.1shows the fuse requirements.

No power should be applied to the instrument while replacing the fuse. Disconnect all cables connected to the instrument before proceeding.

Fuse Replacement Procedure

- **Step 1.** Locate the fuse box in the rear panel beneath the IEC 320 connector. (See **figure 1.4**)




Figure 2.1 Fuse Removal

- **Step 2.** Insert a small flathead screwdriver into the fuse box slit to slide out the fuse box as illustrated in **figure 2.1**.
- **Step 3.** Check the fuse to determine if it must be replaced.

2.4 Output Connections

The waveform generator output circuits are protected against short circuit or nominal accidental voltages applied to the main output connector. The output circuits operate as a 50 Ω voltage source working into a 50 Ω load. At higher frequencies, a non-terminated or improperly terminated output may cause aberrations on the output waveform. In addition, loads with an impedance less than 50 Ω will reduce the waveform amplitude, while loads with an impedance greater than 50 Ω will increase waveform amplitude.

Excessive distortion or aberrations caused by improper termination are less noticeable at lower frequencies, especially with sine and triangle waveforms. To ensure waveform integrity, follow these precautions:

- Use good quality 50 Ω coaxial cable and connectors.
- Make all connections tight and as short as possible.
- Use good quality attenuators, if it is necessary to reduce waveform amplitudes applied to sensitive circuits.
- Use termination or impedance-matching devices to avoid reflections.
- Ensure that attenuators and terminations have adequate power handling capabilities.

If there is a DC voltage across the output load, use a coupling capacitor in series with the load. The time constant of the coupling capacitor and load must be long enough to maintain pulse flatness.

2.4.1 Impedance Matching

If the waveform generator is driving a high impedance, such as a 1 M Ω input impedance (paralleled by a stated capacitance) of an oscilloscope vertical input, connect the transmission line to a 50 Ω attenuator, a 50 Ω termination and to the oscilloscope input. The attenuator isolates the input capacitance of the device and terminates the waveform generator properly.



2.5 Self Test Errors

One or multiple of the errors listed in **table 2.1** will be displayed if the self-test did not complete successfully. If any of these errors occur, please contact B&K Precision.

2.6 Output Check

Follow the steps below to do a quick check of the settings and waveform output.

1. Turn on the instrument and set the instrument to default settings. To set to default, press **Setups**, press **Recall** and select **0**, then **Enter**. The instrument will set both channels with the following parameters:

Waveform Shape: Sine

Frequency: 1.00000000 kHz

Amplitude: 5 .000 Vpp

Offset: 0.000 Vdc

Phase: 0.0 °

Output Impedance: **50 Ω**

- 2. Connect the BNC output of CH1 into an oscilloscope.
- 3. Press the **ON** button on top of CH1 output BNC to turn on the output and observe a sine wave with the parameters above.
- 4. Press the **Frequency** button in the menu and use the rotary knob or the numeric keypad to change frequency. Observe the changes on the oscilloscope display.
- 5. Press the **Amplitude** button in the menu and use the rotary knob or the numeric keypad to change the amplitude. Observe the changes on the oscilloscope display.
- 6. Press the **Offset** option in the menu and use the rotary knob or the numeric keypad to change the DC offset. With the oscilloscope set for DC coupling, observe the changes on the display.
- 7. Now, connect the BNC output of CH2 into an oscilloscope and follow steps 3 to 6 to check its output.

Operation Instructions

3.1 Menu Keys

The menu keys select the main menus for displaying or changing a parameter, function or mode. For more information about each menu or mode click on the corresponding button above.

3.2 Soft Keys

The unit has six soft keys, which are located beneath the screen.

Each key selects the corresponding function. Functions will vary depending on the current menu or display. Certain warning displays and menus will require the sofkeys to proceed. These displays will state to press a **F** key as shown in figure **3.2**. The F keys are the softkeys starting at **(F1)**, the key furthest left, and ending at **(F6)**, the key furthest to the right.




Figure 3.2 Warning



3.3 Numeric Keys

The numeric keys allow the configuration of various parameters. Using the numeric keys provides a fast and precise input.

If the numeric keypad is used to enter a value the unit of the value can be chosen by selecting the softkey corresponding to the desired unit.

3.4 Output Control

buttons toggles the outputs On/Off of the corresponding channel. When output is enabled, The the ON button will light up with a white LED.

Both outputs can be enabled at the same time, but only the parameters of the chosen channel can be viewed and configured at a time.

- To toggle between channels press the CHANNEL button.
- The **Channel** seleceted can be viewed in the top left section of the display.

3.5 Display

The display contains five components.




Figure 3.5 Display

Chanel

The Channel can be seen in the top left portion of the screen. When CH1 is selected the CH1 section will be displayed and highlighted in yellow. See figure 3.5.




Figure 3.6 CH2 Display

When in CH2 is selected the CH2 section will be highlighted in skyblue. See figure 3.6.

Waveform Preview provides a view of the waveform based on the set parameters.




Figure 3.8 Waveform Preview

PARAM Key

The PARAM key opens the Waveform Parameters Menu.

Select the parameter to be set. Depending on the chosen waveform the available parameters may change. The common parameters such as: frequency, amplitude, offset and internal impedance will always be available regardless of the waveform chosen.

To view the parameters available for each waveform view the chapter of desired waveform. View the available waveforms in the **Wave Key** section.





Figure 4.1 Frequency

For more information on each waveform click on the corresponding waveform listed above.

Sine Wave

Press the wave button then use the softkey **F1** to select **Sine**. The screen shown in figure **6.1** will be displayed. The parameters available for sine waveforms include frequency, period, amplitude, high level, low level, offset, and phase.




Figure 6.1 Sine

6.1 Frequency

Frequency is one of the most important parameters of basic waveforms. For different instrument models and waveforms, the available ranges of frequency are different. The 4078C has a range of 1 μ (Hz) to 30 MHZ, while the 4079C has a range of 1 μ (Hz) to 50 MHZ.

To select the **Sine Waveform**: Press the wave button then use the softkey **F1** to select **Sine**.

To configure the frequency of the waveform:

- Press the PARAM button then use the softkey to select Frequency.
 - The frequency shown on the screen when the instrument is powered on is the default value or the set value of last power down.
- Input the desired frequency.
- Use the numeric keypad to input the parameter value directly, and press the corresponding softkey to select the parameter's unit.

– MHz – KHz – Hz – mHz

• Or use the arrow keys to select the digit to be edit, and then use the knob to change its value.

Note:

When using the numeric Keypad to enter the value, the navigating arrow keys cannot be used to move across already inputted values.



6.2 Amplitude

To set the amplitude:

Press the PARAM button then use the softkey to select **Amplitude**.

- The amplitude shown on the screen when the instrument is powered on is the default value or the set value of last power down.
- Press the Amplitude softkey again to switch into the Amplitude parameter if Offset was the chosen parameter
 (the current operation is highlighted in a white color).
- Input the desired amplitude.
 - Use the numeric keypad to input the parameter value directly, and press the corresponding key to select the parameter unit.

Or use the arrow keys to select the digit to edit, and then use the knob to change its value.



6.3 Offset

The default value is 0 Vdc.

To set the offset:

Press the PARAM button then use the softkey to select **Offset**.

- The offset shown on the screen when the instrument is powered on is the default value or the set value of last power down.
- Press the Offset softkey again to switch into the Offset parameter if Amplitude was the chosen parameter (the current operation is highlighted in a white color).
- Input the desired amplitude.
 - Use the numeric Keypad to input the parameter value directly, and press the corresponding softkey to select the parameter unit.

- V - mV

• Or use the arrow keys to select the digit to edit, and then use the knob to change its value.

6.4 Change Unit

Press the corresponding softkey, **F4**, to toggle between the units of the **Amplitude**:

– Vp-p – dBm – mVrms



6.5 50 Ω/ HI-Z




Figure 7.1 Square Wave




Figure 7.2 Duty Cycle




Figure 8.1 Triangle Wave




Figure 8.2 Duty Cycle




Figure 9.1 Pulse Wave




Figure 10.1 ARB Wave

- 2. Press the Marker softkey to enter the Marker Menu.

10.10 Edit

Enter data for creating arbitrary waveforms. You can enter data one point at a time, as a value at an address, draw a line from one point (a value at an address) to another point, create a predefined waveform, or combine these to create complex waveforms. The valid data values range is -32767 to 32767. The valid waveform memory addresses range from 1 to maximum memory length of instrument.

The data value governs the output amplitude of that point of the waveform, scaled to the instrument output amplitude. Therefore, a value of 32767 corresponds to positive peak amplitude, 0 corresponds to the waveform offset, and -32767 corresponds to the negative peak amplitude.

To enter the Waveform Editing mode:

Press the WAVE button then use the soft key to select ARB > Edit.




Figure 10.5 ARB Editing Menu




Figure 10.6 Point Menu




Figure 10.7 Line Menu




Figure 10.8 ARB Edit Predefined

Scale

100% scale spans the waveform scale from -32767 to 32767. Scale factors are limited by the point data value of the starting point. This limitation is automatically calculated and applied. To select the scale:

- 2. Press the **Predefined** softkey.
- 3. Press the **Scale/Offset** softkey to toggle between the **Scale** and the **Offset** function.




Figure 10.9 ARB Shape Menu




Figure 10.10 ARB More Menu




Figure 10.11 ARB Copy Menu




Figure 10.12 ARB Clear Menu




Figure 10.13 ARB Protection Menu




Figure 10.14 ARB Save Warning




Figure 11.1 Output Modes Menu

11.1 Continuous

Press the MODE button then use the soft keys to select **Continuous**.

The waveform will continuously be outputted.

11.2 Trigger

In Trigger Mode, the waveform output can be controlled by three different sources. Find more information on these trigger sources the section **Trigger Source**. Press the button then use the soft keys to select **Trigger**.

11.3 Gate

Press the MODE button then use the soft keys to select **Gate**.

In gated mode, the generator controls the waveform output according to the gate signal level. The menu refers to high as **POS** and low as **NEG**.

When the gated signal is "high", the generator outputs a continuous waveform. When the gated signal is "low", the generator first completes the output of the current period and then stops.

External NEG:

When the gated signal is "high", the generator first completes the output of the current period and then stops. When the gated signal is "low", the generator outputs a continuous waveform

11.4 Burst

The Burst function can generate versatile waveforms. Burst times can last a specific number of waveform cycles. Press the button then use the soft keys to select **Burst**.

Triggers a set number cycles for each trigger event. The number of cycles (**N-Count**) can be set from 2 to 999999.

11.5 Trigger Source

Triggers can be controlled in three ways: Manual, Internal Rate, and External.



Manual

Press the MODE button then use the soft keys to select **Trigger Source > Manual**.

A burst will be generated from the corresponding channel when the Trigger softkey is pressed when manual trigger is selected.

Internal Rate

Press the button then use the soft keys to select **Trigger Source** > **Internal**.

The generator outputs continuous burst waveform when internal trigger is selected. Change the internal trigger rate displayed with the rotary input knob or numeric keypad.

External

Press the MODE button then use the soft keys to select **Trigger Source > External**.

The generator accepts the trigger signal through the TRIG IN connector at the rear panel when external trigger is selected.

A burst will be generated according to the signal level.

When External Trigger source is selected, an additional menu button **POS / NEG** becomes available to select the level of the external trigger signal. **POS** specifiges a high level for a burts and **NEG**. specifies a low level for a burst.

Sweep Key

In **Sweep Mode**, the generator steps from the start frequency to the stop frequency in the sweep time specified by the user. The waveforms that support sweep include sine, square, and triangle.

To select the **Sweep Mode**: Press the button.




Figure 12.1 Sweep Mode Menu

Press the button then use the soft key **Sweep On/Sweep Off** to toggle the sweep function on and off. Sweep is not available for **Pulse** or **ARB** waveforms.

12.2 Start/Stop

- 1. Press the button then use the soft key Sweep Start/Stop to toggle between Start and Stop.
 - The selected parameter will be highlighted in white.
- 2. Input the desired Start/Stop frequencies.
 - Use the numeric keyboard to input value directly, then press the corresponding softkey to select the parameter unit.
 - Or use the arrow keys to select the digit to edit, and then use the knob to change its value.

12.3 Rate

To set the sweep rate:

- 1. Press the SWEEP button then use the soft keys to select **Rate**.
- 2. Input the desired rate.




Figure 13.1 Modulation Menu

13.1 AM

The modulated waveform consists of two parts: the carrier and the modulating waveform. In AM, the amplitude of the carrier varies with the instantaneous voltage of the modulating waveform.

Press the MODUL button then use the soft keys to select **AM**.




Figure 13.2 AM Menu

AM On/Off

AM Shape

To select the shape of the modulated wave:

 - Use the numeric keyboard to input value directly, then press the corresponding softkey to select the parameter unit.
 - Or use the arrow keys to select the digit to edit, and then use the knob to change its value.



Internal/External

When internal AM modulation source is selected, press the **Shape** softkey to select Sine, Square, and Triangle as modulating waveform.

When external AM modulation source is selected, the generator accepts external modulating signal from the **Modulation In** connector at the rear panel. At this time, the amplitude of the modulated waveform is controlled by the signal level applied to the connector.

- 1. Press the button then use the soft keys Internal/External to toggle between Internal and External.
- 2. Select the desired modulation source.

13.2 FM




Figure 13.3 FM Menu

When internal FM modulation source is selected, press the **Shape** softkey to select Sine, Square, and Triangle as modulating waveform.

When external FM modulation source is selected, the generator accepts external modulating signal from the **Modulation In** connector at the rear panel. At this time, the amplitude of the modulated waveform is controlled by the signal level applied to the connector.

- 1. Press the button then use the soft keys Internal/External to toggle between Internal and External.

13.3 FSK

FSK is Frequency Shift Keying, the output frequency of which switches between two preset frequencies (carrier frequency and the hop frequency or sometimes known as mark frequency (1) and space frequency (0)).

Press the MODUL button then use the soft keys to select **FSK**.




Figure 13.4 FSK Menu

13.4 **PWM**

PWM is Pulse Width Modulation, the carrier is a pulse waveform used to control the average voltage by turning the switch between the supply and the load on and off.




Figure 13.5 PWM Menu




Figure 13.6 PM Menu

- 1. The selected parameter will be highlighted in white.
- 2. Enter the desired Hi. Phase/Lo. Phase 0 to 360°.
 - Use the numeric keyboard to input value directly.
 - Or use the arrow keys to select the digit to edit, and then use the knob to change its value.

13.6.1 Rate

Set the rate of the alternation between the low and high frequencies:

Press the MODUL button then use the soft keys to select **Rate**.




Figure 14.1 Setups Key Menu




Figure 15.1 Utility Menu




Figure 15.3 LAN Settings




Figure 15.4 Restore Factory Defaults




Figure 15.5 Reset




Figure 15.6 GPIB




Figure 15.7 Standard GPIB Connector






Figure 15.8 Pass Code


